

RESOLUTION # 172

RESOLUTION FOR THE DESTRUCTION OF NOXIOUS WEEDS

To All Property Owners:

Be It Resolved, By The Board of Supervisors of Mitchell County:

That pursuant to the provisions of Chapter 317, Code of Iowa, 1987, it is hereby ordered:

1. That each owner and each person in the possession or control of any land in Mitchell County, shall cut, burn, or otherwise destroy all noxious weeds thereon, as defined in this chapter, at such times in each year and in such manner as shall prevent said weed from blooming or coming to maturity and shall keep said lands free from such growth of any other weeds as shall render the streets or highways adjoining said lands unsafe for public travel. Noxious weeds shall be cut or otherwise destroyed on or before the following dates and as often thereafter as is necessary to prevent seed production.

Group 1

(June 15 to 30)
Canada Thistle, Russian Knapweed,
Buckhorn, Wild Mustard, Poison
Hemlock, Wild Sunflower.

Group 2

(July 1 to 15)
Field Bindweed, Wild Carrot

Group 3

(July 1 to 15)
Horse Nettle, Perennial Sow Thistle,
Quack Grass, Butter-Print, Puncture
Vine, Cocklebur, Bull Thistle.

2. That each land owner and each person in the possession or control of any lands in Mitchell County infested with any noxious weeds, including quack grass, thistles of all kinds, field bindweed, horse nettle, leafy spurge, perennial peppergrass, poison Hemlock, wild sunflower and Russian knapweed, shall adopt a program of weed destruction, prescribed by the Weed Commissioner, which in five years may be expected to destroy and will immediately keep under control such infestations of said noxious weeds.

3. That if the owners or persons in possession or control of any land in Mitchell County fail to comply with the foregoing orders, the Weed Commissioner shall cause this to be done and the expense of said work, including costs of serving notice and other costs, if any, to be assessed against the real estate.

4. That the County Auditor be, and is, hereby directed to cause notice of the making and entering of the foregoing order by one publication in each of the newspapers in the County.

The foregoing Resolution was adopted by the Mitchell County Board of Supervisors at a regular adjourned meeting held on June 18, 1987.
